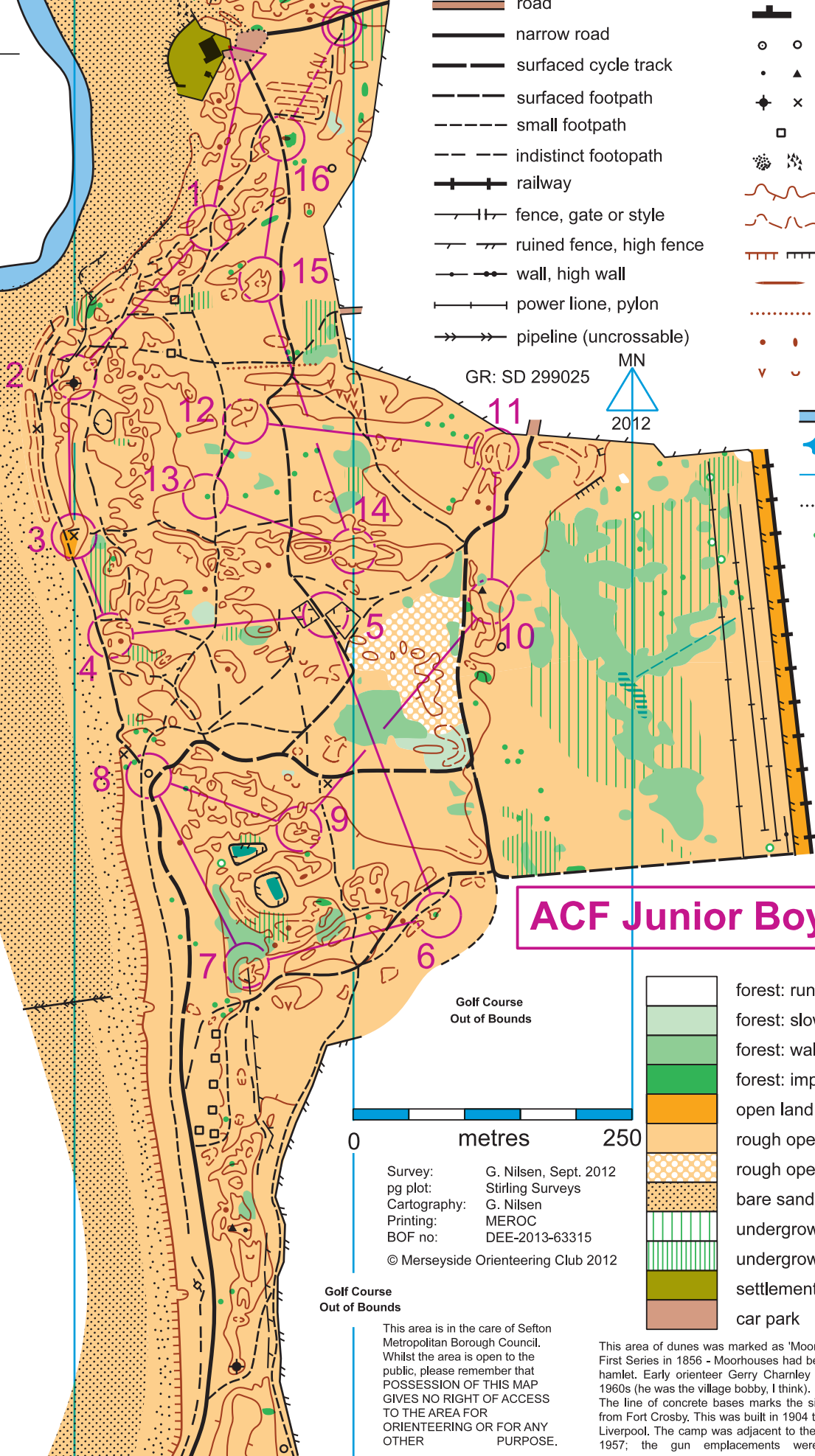

This area of dunes was marked as 'Moorhouse Marsh' on the OS First Series in 1856 - Moorhouses had been the name of the local hamlet. Early orienteer Gerry Chanley lived in Hightown in the 1960s (he was the village bobby, I think). The line of concrete bases marks the site of gun emplacements from Fort Crosby. This was built in 1904 to protect the approach to Liverpool. The camp was adjacent to the north and was closed in 1957; the gun emplacements were destroyed in 1967.
